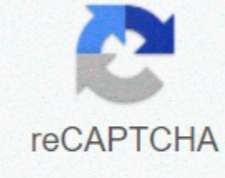

Additional guides: Great Players Sony Crackle, Crackle or Crackle Plus Once known simply as Crackle, this free streaming site has gone through almost as many name changes as P. Diddy. Initially controlled by Sony, it is now a joint venture between Sony and Chicken Soup for Soul Entertainment (CSS). This partnership created a new entity called Crackle Plus, and it was thought that it would also become the name of the streaming service too. Still, one look at the site, and clearly that simplicity won. It's just called Crackle. Whatever you call it, the service includes content from six AD-backed CSS streaming services (Popcornflix, Popcornflix Kids, Popcornflix Comedy, Frightpix, Españolflix and Trul), as well as some Sony movies and TV shows. You'll find plenty of blockbusters like Speed, The Transporter, and Close Encounters of the third kind, and a generous scattering of obscure but interesting B-movies. Crackle is a great resource, although constant outings with advertisers can age pretty quickly. The service is offered in 21 countries but has closed its Canadian, Hispanic and Australian offerings. IMDb TV Newer before this round is an IMDb TV owned by Amazon (formerly known as it offers free TV shows and ad-supported movies. In February 2020 acquired the rights to more than 20 Disney-owned TV series, including Lost, Desperate Housewives, Malcolm in the Middle, and My So-Called Life. It is also the only site that allows free broadcasting of Lost and Malcolm in the middle. Other TV shows in his relatively small library include Fringe, Heroes, Quantum Leap, and Court Files. Films include Memento, La La Land, Drive, Monster, Donnie Darko, Dune, Illusionist, Zodiac, Clue, and many others. You can watch IMDb TV online, Amazon Fire and Apple TV devices, and through the Amazon Prime app, which you can find on many smart TVs, tablets and phones. IMDb TV is only for the U.S. at the moment, although European expansion is in the works. Vudu Walmart, owned by Vudu, may be better known for its subscription streaming service, but the platform also has an impressive and free ad-supported content section. Titles such as Escort, 10,000 Days, and The Offer are good examples of what you'll find. If you take a cruise through a choice of site 4K/HDR titles, there are even one or two free viewing options. You'll still need a Vudu account, but you can create one for free. The Vudu app is already supported by a large number of platforms, including Roku, Apple TV, game consoles and many others. In addition, there is an app for most mobile devices. Vudu is only available in the U.S. Hoopla As it is for a good deal: Sign up for library cards and get free downloads or movie streams, no ads at all. It's a bargain when you use Hoopla, a digital media streaming platform that collaborates with local libraries to allow members to access borrowed content online. It's similar to Overdrive, but with more than just e-books and audiobooks. The availability of any given header will depend on your location and the number of copies available for download, but we found some surprisingly decent moves when we checked in August 2020. Streaming will work on any device with a browser, while downloads require the Hoopla app on a mobile device. Not every library currently supports Hoopla, so make sure you ask. However, in 2019, the company launched its own free ad-backed streaming service with a collection of films and TV shows from studios such as MGM, Warner, Lionsgate and Legendary. It's available worldwide, though the headline selection will vary widely by region. You can access a collection of movies and shows from your browser, or on any of the huge number of devices that support Plex client software such as Apple TV, Roku, smart TVs, etc. All you need is a free Plex account and you're good to go. For those who already use Plex as their media server, free ad-supported settings can be added to existing server categories, making the experience completely flawless. Pluto TV Although it may be known as a higher service, Pluto TV is still worthy of your attention. Not only does it host free on-demand movies, but it's also a free live TV streaming service, hosting content curated from around the internet. Although channels change wildly, we focus here on movies. Pluto TV currently has several live movie channels, perfect if you want to watch something but don't know what. There are two channels of general purpose films, the rest focused on specific genres or categories including action films, Flicks of Rage, Horror 24/7, Classic Movies, Black Movies, Gravity Movies, and Asylum. The service operates in the U.S., as well as many international locations. The Pluto TV on-demand movie library is relatively small and often rotating, but offers as much variety as its live movie channels. It's also available on a ton of devices in addition to your computer, including Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Roku devices and many others. To learn more about Pluto TV, check out our full guide to the service. Tubi TV Another up-and-comer, Tubi is very similar to Sony Crackle, in that it offers both free movies and TV episodes. No matter which device you're using, chances are good enough that you'll be able to watch Tubi as it's available on Android, iOS, Roku, Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Samsung Smart TVs, Sony Smart TVs, PlayStation 4, Xbox One, and online. As with the vast majority of services on this list, you'll need to watch a few commercials, but that's what keeps the service free. Tubi has content from more than 200 partners, including NBCUniversal, which brings with it nearly 400 classic titles such as Xena: Warrior Princess, Hercules: Legendary Travel, A-Team, Punky Brewster, as well as original versions of Magnum, P.I., The Bionic Woman and Transformers. Cult classics such as Assault on Precinct 13, Sleepaway Camp and C.H.U.D., as well as cult classics such as 10 Cloverfield Lane and No Country for Old Men, can also be found in the growing catalogue. Independent and documentary SnagFilms Snagfilms is an on-demand video site that sports a selection of films you can't find anywhere online. Founded in 2008, it has amassed nearly 10,000 independent documentaries and short stories. There are many rare gems to watch here, and since the founders have worked to build dozens of partnerships, there are also plenty of different streaming devices that support free SnagFilms. The service is currently available as a free app for iOS and Android, but it is also compatible with various Roku, Kindles devices and a host of other streaming devices. The main site is also a breeze to navigate. Snagfilms is available internationally, but some titles are only available in the U.S. and Canada. Kanopy Just like Hoopla, Kanopy is not only free to use, but it's also commercially free if you have a card library. Originally founded in 2008 in Australia as an educational tool, now offers a library of more than 30,000 films through its partnerships with more than 200 libraries. There is a focus on independent free films and documentaries (the company even has access to many recent films from the A24 catalog), but you'll find all sorts of movies available, and even more are on track thanks to a deal that will see the entire catalog of director Fred Wiseman coming into service. Kanopy is internationally available, but content may vary depending on location. Top Documentaries Love Documentaries? So are we. You know what they say, the truth is stranger than fiction. Aptly named Top Documentaries, Hands Down, the best site for documentaries. Not every movie choice is long, but a good documentary doesn't have to be long - some of the best are under the 60-minute mark. Given a library of more than 3,000 films, the site also has a simple and simple layout and categorizes all of its films based on the issue, making it easy to find something you're interested in at once. The content is not hosted on the site, but from other sites such as YouTube, Vimeo, Daily Motion, etc. It's internationally available, but not all content will work in all places. Archive.org offers a wonderful treasure trove of old movies you've probably never heard of, as well as a handful you recognize. Retrovision Retrovision is another public domain site that has hundreds of classic films from several different eras. The word classic may be up for interpretation - there are some movies here that were made most recently, like last year, and not all Retrovision movies are high quality - but there are still a lot of good things here. Retrovision is also a well-designed site that allows users to filter based on genre. This is not limited to feature films, as there is a robust collection of classic TV shows to choose from. Shocker Internet Drive-In Shocker Internet Drive-In is a bit of a niche and its website looks like it was made in the 90s, but it's a great resource. The site is updated weekly with featured horror classics, which are then available for free download as WMV files in the website's snack bar. The site is a fun little blast from the past, with weekly framed screenings in digital drive. Users can also purchase DVD copies of any movie on the site for as little as \$3. If you miss the old days of the internet, when it was more like the Wild West and everything was less polished, it could be for you. The downside of so many different services available is that if you have a movie in mind but don't know where to watch it, you have a lot of different directories to snuck in hopes of finding it. Fortunately, as long as you have a smartphone, you probably have access to a tool that can help you. Apple's TV app, which is available on iOS as well as on several other platforms including Apple TV, Roku, Amazon Fire TV, as well as LG and Samsung smart TVs, allows you to search for more than 50 different streaming services. For Android users, the Google Play Movies & TV app offers similar functionality, although the number of connected services is smaller.
